The month of November is dedicated to the Holy Souls. On All Souls Day, a **plenary indulgence** may be gained by visiting any parish church or public oratory, and there recite one Our Father and One Hail Mary. On all the days from **November 1-8** inclusive, a **plenary indulgence** may be gained once a day, applicable only to the Poor Souls. It is granted to those who visit a cemetery (it does not have to be Catholic) and pray, even if only mentally, for the faithful departed. Those who recite the prayer "Eternal rest grant unto them O Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon them. May their souls, and the souls of all the faithful departed, rest in peace. Amen." can receive a partial indulgence once a day for the month of November.

Catechism on Holy Week

The 1962 rite abolished the folded chasuble and the “broad stole” (*stola longior*). The custom of the broad stole is ancient, and no one had ever dared alter this custom because of its antiquity. The cropped chasuble and the bigger stole represent the extraordinary sorrow of the Church during the days of Holy Week. The reformers of the liturgy were simply following the principle that “less is more;” a principle of modern architecture. They thought that “modern man” (an undefined entity if there ever was one) did not care much for symbolism and wanted things plain, unadorned, and simple. Of course the laity were not consulted on this – there was no demand for these changes from them. Nor was there a demand from parish priests or bishops, but from liturgical experts.

In the 1952 Missal, the palm branches are blessed on the altar – the “horn” of the Epistle side if you will – after a reading, a gradual, a Gospel, and above all a Preface with a “*Sanctus*” that introduces the prayers of blessing. This is the ancient rite of the so-called *missa sicca* (dry Mass). This rite parallels the Mass, with an Introit, a Collect (no *Kyrie*), and Epistle, a Gradual and a Gospel. After the Gospel, there is another prayer which corresponds to the Secret of the Mass. The conclusion of this prayer leads into the Preface Dialogue, and a Preface at the end of which is sung the *Sanctus*. Then follows a kind of “canon” in which the palms or branches are blessed with five prayers. The branches are sprinkled with holy water then incensed, and the priest sings a sixth prayer which corresponds to the communion antiphon. Then the branches are distributed to the attending clergy and faithful, and the choir sings the *Pueri Hebraeorum*. Then the priest sings another prayer, which corresponds, both in position and thought, to the Postcommunion of the Mass, after which the procession begins.

The Carmelite Monastery is located at 6138 S. Gallup St. in Littleton, about 1 mile from OLMC.

From the Pastor:

- The intention of this Thursday’s holy hour is for all Catholics who are confused in any way regarding their faith; that they may be strengthened by the Sacred Heart.

- My trip to the Carmel in Traverse City was uneventful, even though long. But the stay at the monastery was a great blessing. The northern woods of Michigan are utterly beautiful, thick and lush with spruce, sugar maples, northern and white pine, and many other delightful and lovely trees. It pleased the Creator to endow the area with splendid beauty. But the nuns switched over to Tradition only a year ago, and I was amazed at how far they have gone. There was great peace and great joy in them (typical of a good monastery, like our Carmelites on Gallup street), and I was greatly edified and comforted by their example. What a blessed place it is.

- The monastery has had the full liturgical Tradition for only one year, but my, they have made great progress in a very short time. It isn’t an easy transition you know.

- Mother Prioress asked me to give a talk to the laity (they have a Latin class there attended by kids in high school to 80 year-olds. I felt at home. Anywhere I’ve been that has the Tradition – in union with the Holy See – has also a good combination of zeal for the honor of our Lord and His One, True, Holy and Apostolic Church, and at the same time a jolly sense of humor. These Northern Michigan people are the salt of the earth.

- A curious thing happened while I was there. Mother Prioress had asked me to give a talk to the laity, and while speaking with them I heard of a layman who was doing good work locally. He financed an opera house in which really good opera or

classical music could be made available to the locals for a very inexpensive price. The house is quite beautiful, and the ceiling has the constellations painted on it just as the stars would have been for the dedication of the house. This layman is a Catholic, and has done many other good things locally, and has been seen going to the traditional Mass at the monastery. I asked, “Who is this man?” The response surprised me. “His name is Michael Moore, and he makes documentary films.” I was non-plussed. This doesn’t make me like his movies, but inspired me to pray for him. I wish him well.

- I also had dinner with two excellent priests who say the old rite. We conversed for hours over a good Italian meal. One of the things discussed was the canonization of Paul VI, and how to make sense of it. Fr. Libby, the pastor of Holy Rosary Church in Cedar, MI, has tried to find hagiographic material on Paul VI, and so have many others. The purpose would be to explain to the faithful why the pope is being held up as a saint, worthy of devotion. But so far, nothing has been found. There are examples of him doing his job and doing it well (e.g. standing up to the Commission and writing *Humanae Vitae*), but this is not heroic virtue (necessary for canonization). What miracles did he perform in life? What did he gloriously suffer, or teach, or where did he shine in the darkness in a particular way? What great spiritual works did he leave?

- And moreover, where is the *cultus*, the flowering of devotion of the laity to a saint, that is the most important of all the tests after miracles? I remember visiting the tomb of Paul VI once, and was struck that there wasn’t a soul there praying. No one. I wish I could make sense of his canonization, but I can’t.
