St Martin's Collection

The parish is collecting winter gear for a homeless shelter to be donated on the feast of St Martin (November 11th). Coats, hats, gloves, scarves in all sizes are needed. Boxes for collecting these items are already set out at the entrance to the parish hall.

Poor Souls in Purgatory

The month of November is dedicated to the Holy Souls. On All Souls Day, a plenary indulgence may be gained by visiting any parish church or public oratory, and there recite one Our Father and One Hail Mary. On all the days from November 1-8 inclusive, a plenary indulgence may be gained once a day, applicable only to the Poor Souls. It is granted to those who visit a cemetery (it does not have to be Catholic) and pray, even if only mentally, for the faithful departed. Those who recite the prayer "Eternal rest grant unto them O Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon them. May their souls, and the souls of all the faithful departed, rest in peace. Amen." can receive a partial indulgence once a day for the month of November.

An Appointment to Court

The firm resolution to belong to God should produce in us a determination to think only of Him, especially when at His court, which is a church with the Most Blessed Sacrament. This can be practiced in two ways, and practicing (like the priests and altar boys before the ceremonies, or the choir and schola before singing) is most necessary to keep our appointments at court. First, we should accustom ourselves never to voluntarily entertain thoughts, or reflect on subjects which do not concern God directly or indirectly as to the duties of our states in life in general, or in particular. In other words, it would be most harmful for a priest to fantasize about being married, or in the secular state at all. And the best way of dealing with idle thoughts is not to combat them, but just to let them drop, like a stone into the sea. Gradually the habit of acting thus will become easy.

From the Pastor:

- The 500th anniversary of the Protestant Revolt is coming up, and the Catholic responses vary from a cheerful and sentimental encouragement to a far more realistic assessment. The latter is an insert for the bulletin. It is from my old friend Bishop Fabian Bruskevitz, the retired bishop of Lincoln. I hope you appreciate the truth of what he says as much as I did. A parishioner alerted me to the interview.

- Sometimes when I drive, I tune in Protestant preachers on the radio. I listened to one recently – don't know his name – for about six minutes. There were the standard fillers (listen to me now – hear His word – open your hearts wide – can I hear an amen, etc) and enthusiasm and excitement given smoothly with a good speaking voice. Victory in the Lord! Believe it Friends! He sounded like a chipper, happy man. And he went into a standard denunciation of the Catholic Faith (not mentioning the Church) and basically said it is useless to go to confession or say many prayers or worry about salvation, etc. Then he went to a standard recital of Gen. 15:6, and the commentary on it by St. Paul, “For what saith the scripture? Abraham believed God, and it was reputed to him unto justice.” (Rom. 4:3) I fantasized about questioning that preacher.

For example, Abraham built altars to God on the plain of Moreh and in Bethel. He “looked for a city which hath foundations, whose builder and maker is God.” This takes place before his justification in Gen. 15. So, because there are ten years between his first mentioned demonstration of saving faith and the subsequent declaration of righteousness in Gen. 15, at what point did his faith save him?

Furthermore, justification is seen as the entrance into the New Covenant. So when did God give the sign of the Covenant? When he first believed at 75 years of age (Gen. 12)? Or in Gen. 15 when it says he acquired imputed righteousness, or in Gen. 17 when he was 99 years old? And when the sign of the covenant was established to be circumcision, and Abraham was already justified, what would have happened if he did not circumcise himself, or refused to sacrifice Isaac? Would he have lost righteousness? And in the epistle of St. James, it is clear that he thinks Abraham was not justified in Gen. 15, but much later when he offered up Isaac. The radio preachers never, ever address these difficult questions.

In the end, underneath all that slick talking on the radio, is poison trying to get people not to change their lives and repent, but to do nothing in regard to their salvation.
