An Appointment to Court

There is a kind of abandonment which is necessary to be a good member of the court of our King. Put simply by Bl. Claude de la Columbiere, “It is confining our whole attention to fulfilling as perfectly as possible the holy will of God to its full extent, abandoning everything else to him, such as the care of all our temporal and also our spiritual interests, as, our advancement in virtue.” This may sound odd, but he is so right in this. Entering the sacred temple is not a time to be concerned even with how we are doing in the interior life. Instead, it is time to worship. But if we feel a desire, or fear, or have ideas and begin to form projects regarding our own interests or those of our loved ones, then we could say a little prayer about these, again from Bl. Claude: “Lord, I sacrifice all this; I give up all my miserable interests to You. And all that You please, all that You wish, happen. However, as there may be occasions when it is reasonably necessary to think and to act, I beg You to give me the thought at the right time, and thus I shall do nothing but follow what you deign to inspire, and I accept in advance either good or adverse results.”

From the Pastor:

- The holy hour this Thursday will be offered up in reparation for the damage done to the Church by the Protestant revolution.

- This Advent I want to be praying for some particular intentions, viz., for any parishioner who has drifted from the practice of the Faith, or who has apostatized. So if you have a family member who was a parishioner here but who is not practicing their faith, please send me their name and an address on a small piece of paper. I will place the paper you send over my heart, and then offer a full day of prayer for them. Each day I pray the entire Divine Office, 15 decades of the Rosary, 30 minutes of spiritual reading, 30 minutes meditation, the Angelus, preparation for Mass and thanksgiving, plus other prayers. All these will be offered for that person, plus a penance of some kind. After the day of prayer, I'll write a letter to the person inviting them to come back. Please send these to me before Advent begins, if you want me to say those prayers for a loved one.

- And please join me in those prayers. I won't give the person's name being prayed for, but will indicate on which days the prayer is occurring.

- The role of social media in suicide is large. Archbishop Aquila's last column in the *Denver Register* was good on this. The result of the suicides in Littleton public schools has sparked a movement to pledge not to use social media at all for a period of time. Teens who made the blackout pledge say giving up social media is like trying to break an addiction. "I've fallen a couple of times, but I'm trying to get back on it," said one who contacted the Offline October organizers for advice. A survey of 400 teens participating in the blackout found that 50 percent had

previously been spending two to three hours daily on social media and 50 percent said they had been depressed. No doubt. Three hours a day on Facebook would depress anyone.

- I saw in the news that the FSSP recording of the Requiem Mass (the CD is simply called *Requiem*) topped the bill board charts at #1. It has struck the living quite well. The Denver classical station plays selections fairly regularly.

- "This young generation does not know anything about the tradition of the Church, about her music, art, architecture, devotions, or saints. When we do encounter them, we do not always think, 'This is old.' In fact, we often think, 'This is new. I had no idea that this existed.' This discovery should be a cause of joy for us, that the Church is always young, finding awe and wonder in places that we would not have expected or that we ourselves have discounted." (Fr. - "Liberalism of the 1950s and '60s exalted civil liberties, individualism, and dissident thought and speech. 'Question authority' was our generational rubric when I was in college. But today's liberalism has become grotesquely mechanistic and authoritarian: It's all about reducing individuals to a group identity, defining that group in permanent victim terms, and denying others their democratic right to challenge that group and its ideology. Political correctness represents the fossilized institutionalization of once-vital revolutionary ideas, which have become mere rote formulas. It is repressively Stalinist, dependent on a labyrinthine, parasitic bureaucracy to enforce its empty dictates." Camille Paglia
