Catechism on Holy Week

Following the procession to the doors of the church, there was created in the reformed Holy Week a prayer, which was to be prayed facing the people. This curious addition gums up the preceding ceremonies because of its arbitrary nature. The rubrics don't reflect this change, which means that no one knows where the missal is to be placed, or who is to hold it. It is likely safe to say that this *lacuna* comes simply in the great haste the reformers were in to accomplish a very difficult task.

Fr. Braga (one of the principal architects of this) admitted 50 years later, that "The element that is out of place in the new Ordo [of Holy Week] is the concluding oration of the procession, which disrupts the unity of the celebration."

Next, the distinction between the Passion and the Gospel were eliminated, and the last sentence of the Passion was suppressed. This is likely due to a publishing error, and not something intentional – again the result of haste. The Passion had always been marked with a narrative style, divided into three voices and followed by the Gospel, which was marked off by the fact that it was sung by a single deacon on a different tone, and was accompanied by the use of incense, but not candles. The reform of Holy Week confused these, where Passion and Gospel were melded into a single chant. The result was that the Gospel properly so-called, was in effect suppressed.

From the Pastor:

- The intention for this week's holy hour is for the flourishing of vocations from this parish.

- The Rev. Br. Brian Zuelke, O.P., who used to come here, will be ordained to the priesthood in St. Louis on May 18. His love for St. Thomas, the Dominican way of life, and the Dominican Rite of Mass is exemplary. Please say a prayer for him, as being a priest in these times will become increasingly difficult.

- The City of Littleton goofed up our scheduled first hearing, and they informed us with an apology. The first hearing will now be April 8. I had scheduled a high school religion class for that evening, so this class needs to be moved to April 22, at 7 PM.

- Three decades of neuropsychology research have shown us numerous ways in which human judgment, like memory and hearing, is prone to systematic mistakes. The mind overestimates vivid dangers, falls into ruts, and manages multiple pieces of data poorly. It is swayed unduly by desire and emotion and even the time of day. It is affected by the order in which information is presented and how problems are framed. Some of these are obviously out of our control. But some are in our control, especially if we have the distortions pointed out to us. These distortions interfere with the operation of the virtues, and our ability to pray. Here are some of the most common:

1. **Mind reading.** You assume that you know what people think without having sufficient evidence of their thoughts. "He thinks I'm a loser."
2. **Fortune-telling.** You predict the future negatively: things will get worse, or there is danger ahead. "I'll fail that exam," or "I won't get the job."

3. **Labeling.** You assign global negative traits to yourself and others. "I'm undesirable," or "He's a rotten person."

4. **Discounting positives.** You claim that the positive things you or others do are trivial. "That's what wives are supposed to do—so it doesn't count when she's nice to me," or "Those successes were easy, so they don't matter."

5. **Negative filtering.** You focus almost exclusively on the negatives and seldom notice the positives. "Look at all of the people who don't like me." "Look at how bad the bishops are."

6. **Overgeneralizing.** You perceive a global pattern of negatives on the basis of a single incident. "This generally happens to me. I seem to fail at a lot of things."

7. **Dichotomous thinking.** You view events or people in all-or-nothing terms. "I get rejected by everyone," or "It was a complete waste of time."

8. **Blaming.** You focus on the other person as the source of your negative feelings, and you refuse to take responsibility for changing yourself. "She's to blame for the way I feel now," or "My parents caused all my problems."

9. **Emotional reasoning.** You let your feelings guide your interpretation of reality. "I feel depressed; therefore, my marriage is not working out."

10. **Inability to disconfirm.** You reject any evidence or arguments that might contradict your negative thoughts. For example, when you have the thought I'm unlovable, you reject as irrelevant any evidence that people like you. Consequently, your thought cannot be refuted. "That's not the real issue. There are deeper problems. There are other factors." "Sedevacantism is the only logical position. Look how bad the pope is."
