Catechism on Holy Week

Following the procession to the doors of the church, there was created in the reformed Holy Week a prayer, which was to be prayed facing the people. This curious addition gums up the preceding ceremonies because of its arbitrary nature. The rubrics don't reflect this change, which means that no one knows where the missal is to be placed, or who is to hold it. It is likely safe to say that this *lacuna* comes simply in the great haste the reformers were in to accomplish a very difficult task.

Fr. Braga (one of the principal architects of this) admitted 50 years later, that "The element that is out of place in the new Ordo [of Holy Week] is the concluding oration of the procession, which disrupts the unity of the celebration."

Next, the distinction between the Passion and the Gospel were eliminated, and the last sentence of the Passion was suppressed. This is likely due to a publishing error, and not something intentional – again the result of haste. The Passion had always been marked with a narrative style, divided into three voices and followed by the Gospel, which was marked off by the fact that it was sung by a single deacon on a different tone, and was accompanied by the use of incense, but not candles. The reform of Holy Week confused these, where Passion and Gospel were melded into a single chant. The result was that the Gospel properly so-called, was in effect suppressed.

From the Pastor:

- The intention for this week's holy hour is for all the priests and people of our parish to celebrate Paschionide and Holy Week with great devotion.

- The hearing of the City Planning Commission went well. The Planning staff of the City recommended unanimously that our rezoning application be approved, and at the end of the hearing, the Planning Commission voted to accept the application unanimously. Two local residents and non-parishioners showed up to testify on our behalf; they gave strong testimonies on what a benefit our parish is to the surrounding community. It sure was pleasing to hear that.

- But what a strange process this was! The City Planning staff of seven people did hours and hours of work and preparation for this. The hearing itself took two and a half hours. The Planning Commission was another seven people. They had eight support staff. So one of the neighbors said in some frustration, "All this work, all these hours, all this time, all these resources expended because this parish lacks some square feet of open space and three parking spaces. Is this really how we should live? Well, rules are rules I guess. But you should let the parish make the improvements to their parish hall. All the neighbors want it." What true words these were. If we keep the parish hall as is, we are in violation of many codes. If we make the improvements, we would be in violation of open space codes. The only solution is to rezone, and fortunately, things look good for that to happen. But at the same time, I must agree with our neighbor. I have a strong sense that all this stuff with the government is a colossal waste of time, money, and energy. The next hearing is with the City Council, which will be on May 7. More time, more energy, and more money must be spent on this.
