Catechism on Holy Week

The last thing to be said about the reform of Palm Sunday for 1956 is that as far as the archives reveal, the Commission decided to remove the narrative of the Last Supper. This was not long (30 verses), so we can doubt if the motive was for saving time. But I can't find the reason for it. Tradition came to narrate the Passion in the synoptic gospels including the institution of the Eucharist, especially because the sacramental separation of the Body and Blood of Christ (the separate consecration too) was held as the herald of the Passion. The narration then of the institution of the Eucharist gave a vital relation of the Last Supper, the sacrifice of Good Friday, and the Eucharist. This passage was eliminated as well from Holy Tuesday and Holy Wednesday, so that it may not be found in the entire liturgical cycle. The only reason I can think of for this rather astounding change, was the great haste in which the Commission was making these changes.

The only change for Holy Monday that was made was to prohibit the prayer *Contra Persecutores Ecclesiae* (against the Church's persecutors), and to prohibit the prayer for the pope. Later on of course, all references to the Church's enemies were removed from the *Novus Ordo Missae*. The suppressed prayer referred to the reality of the Church's persecution by enemies within (via heresy) and without (via violence). Fr. Braga admitted that the Commission had an irenic attitude toward the world, which of course grew much stronger as time went on, such that by the time of St. John XXIII the attitude was that we ought to be friends with the world, not enemies. The reducing of the pope's name from the liturgy began with this change, with the result of a decrease of intercession for the pope. The frequent intercessions for the pope were considered unnecessary.

From the Pastor:

- The intention for this week's holy hour is that the children of the parish would play good games.

- There is a little booklet for free (limited supply) in the vestibule called *St. Thomas Aquinas on Prayer*, by Fr. James Buckley, FSSP. If they are all gone after today, we'll get more. I think he did a good job on this.

- I discovered this weekend that several of the children (I don't know how many) are playing a card game called "Magic: the Gathering." If you allow your children to play this, I must ask that you do not bring that game to the parish grounds. The reasons for this are several:

1. It provides a benign, kindly introduction to sorcery. "The cards are linked to one of five kinds of magic: red, blue, green, white or black. The players, representing sorcerers, use the cards to "kill the other guy before he kills you, with spells, enchantments and creatures like Chaos, Orb...Bad Moon and Animate Dead... (*Washington Post Weekend*).

2. The pictures are intensely ugly, gratuitously violent and disordered, as are the characters depicted.

3. Like Dungeons & Dragons, the famed role-playing game, Magic is a challenging game that calls for intricate strategy and shrewd plays. This must be said in favor of it, however, that strategy is worked out without in the dark context of the occult. Skeletons, blood and

images of death are common. There's the Bone Shaman, the Necrite (shown licking blood off a dagger), Prodigal Sorcerer, Dark Ritual, Sadistic Glee, Torture, Endless Scream and others. One card showing several skeletons and called The Kjeldoran Dead has this quote: "They shall kill those whom once they loved." C Lim-Dul, the Necromancer." Necromancy is communication with the dead through supernatural and/or occult techniques.

4. One should consider the possible results of exposure to these images and terms: desensitization to what is ugly, evil or repulsive, desensitization to sorcery and the occult, an interest in or fascination with death, familiarity with occult terms & concepts, and developing a taste for the bizarre.

5. Fantasy and imagination have a valuable role in our lives, allowing us to create, to appreciate and to be entertained. They are part of how God wired us. But just as anything else human, fantasy and imagination can be misused. Instead of images evoking death and darkness, consider God's words in Phil. 4:8 that tell us to dwell on what is true, honorable, pure and lovely. Dwelling on ugly and bizarre images can break down and pervert our creativity and imagination. But dwelling on the lovely builds us up, lifts us up and enhances our imaginative capacities.
