Catechism on Holy Week

I've been remiss in keeping up with this catechism – my apologies! A lot of time has been expended in trying to deal with much physical pain. But I think I've turned a corner on it.

On Holy Tuesday, there was only one change, and it was the suppression of the passage of St. Mark (14:1-31). This is an account of the institution of the Holy Eucharist, and it was used for the faithful to see the relation between the Institution, and the sacrifice of the Passion. I do not see any reason for this suppression. The verses are sufficiently short in number that just to save time seems not to be the reason, and given the importance of the connection of the Institution and the Passion, to eliminate these verses does not seem to be motivated by a desire for mere simplicity (as strong as that desire was for the reformers). I think, therefore, that it has to do with the elimination of all the verses which warn the faithful about bad communions from the Novus Ordo. The suppression of the above verses is an early move toward this. And the motive behind that is connected, I think, with the great desire for ecumenism, that Protestant Christians would not find an obstacle in this. For them, it seems to me, it would not be possible to receive the Eucharist to one's own damnation. After all, it's just a piece of bread in their churches.

On Holy Wednesday, we see a similar suppression of St. Luke's Gospel (22:1-39). This, too, is about the connection between the Institution and the Passion. This is the third place where the connection was suppressed.

From the Pastor:

- There will not be a holy hour this Thursday, but a high Mass instead for **the Assumption**.

- Keep in mind **this is a holy day of obligation**. We must keep this day holy!

- Thomas Storck put his finger on the state of liberalism in our country rather well, I thought.

What of liberals then? Liberals are very aware of the dangers that the unrestrained pursuit of wealth poses to society, of the potential power of wealth, especially concentrated wealth, to corrupt the political process and to skew public policy in its own favor. Liberals quite rightly point to the tremendous power of the rich to influence the political process, to shape tax policy, environmental and labor legislation, and many other kinds of laws and regulations, in their favor. They likewise realize that when society allows free play to the passion for economic gain, people in general, will begin to look at every relationship and transaction with solely an eye for their own personal gain. The desire to gain tends to color the whole of the life of society.

Moreover, liberals are quite willing to employ the power of the law to ensure that the force of human greed does not violate the common good. A progressive rate of taxation on higher incomes, inheritance taxes, taxes on sales of stock, even a tax on net wealth are advocated by many liberals. Liberals realize that the mere fact of the existence of a desire for more money on the part of people does not give those individuals any right to pursue that desire at the expense of the common good of society.

But while laudably alarmed at the power of

the rich and ready to take legal steps to curb that power, liberals suddenly embrace a free for-all-attitude when it comes to sex. Individuals want sexual pleasure; only repressed puritans and prudes want to prevent this. No matter how much the unrestrained pursuit of sexual pleasure may harm the common good—as in the effects of divorce or out-of-wedlock births on women and children, not to mention the actual children murdered before their births—none of this matters. From being zealous for the common good and ready to place all manner of restraints on human conduct in the economic realm, liberals run to the other extreme and embrace a policy of laissez-faire when it comes to sexual matters. It is hard to understand how liberals do not see, or profess not to see, that the unrestrained pursuit of sexual pleasure can do as much harm to the social fabric as the unrestrained and anti-social pursuit of money. But liberals do not see this. A disordered notion of freedom constitutes almost their entire approach to sexual morality.

- His point is well taken, I think. And connecting what he said to modesty, here's a quote for you: "I love vulgarity. Good taste is death, vulgarity is life." These words written by English fashion designer Mary Quant, who took credit for inventing the miniskirt and hot pants, reveals one of the most important, though rarely pointed out, aspects of the "fashion revolution" that started in the sixties: vulgarity.

Indeed, fashions have increasingly tended toward vulgarity. It is a vulgarity that tramples upon not only good taste and decorum but which reflects a mentality opposed to all order and discipline and to every kind of restraint, be it esthetic, moral, or social, and which ultimately suggests a completely "liberated" standard of behavior.
