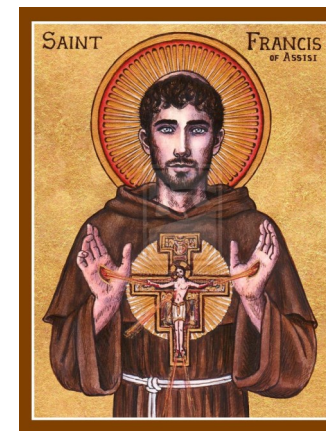

Catechism on Holy Week

When we consider the reformed Holy Week of the Ven. Pius XII, the dates are useful. The *Ordo Hebdomadae Sanctae* (Order of Holy Week) of 1955-1956 begins the huge changes in the liturgy, the “battering ram” as Fr. Braga said, against the traditional liturgy. I’ll just abbreviate it as OHS 1956.

One of the first changes had to do with the color of the vestments. In the *Missale Romanum* 1952 (MR 1952 from here on), violet is used for both the procession and the Mass following. But in the archives of the Commission for the changes, the justification to change the color came from a professor of pastoral theology from a Swiss seminary. He said, “One thing that perhaps might be done...the color red might be restored as was used in the Middle Ages for this solemn procession. The color red recalls the royal purple. In this way the procession is distinguished as something *sui generis*.”

Several things should be noted about this. First, perhaps red does recall the royal purple, but it is very difficult to see how. In the traditional Roman Rite, red always signified either the blood of martyrdom or the fire of the Holy Ghost, though in the Ambrosian Rite it symbolizes the blood of the Passion.

Second, the assertion that this was the practice in the middle ages turns out to be unproven. There is no evidence for this.

Third, the search for things that are *sui generis* in the liturgy and then inserting them willy-nilly into the liturgy is a questionable practice.

The use of violet for both the procession and the Mass shows I think, a better connection between the two events of the triumphal procession into Jerusalem, and the fact that He was entering the city in order to suffer, die and be buried. The use of violet therefore, is the better symbolism.

From the Pastor:

- The intention for this week’s Holy Hour is for all those who have suffered sexual abuse.

- The emergency meeting for all the priests last Wednesday was encouraging to me. The talks from the Archdiocesan attorneys’ were informative and let me know how well the Archdiocese of Denver has fought the sad incursions of the sexual revolution in the clergy. This began ten years before the Dallas Accords, by the vigilance of Cardinal Stafford, then was followed up by Archbishop Chaput and continued by Archbishop Aquila. The presentation on moral theology by Fr. Luis of our neighbor parish St. Mary’s was outstanding and solid. Fr. Ripperger gave an excellent talk about the demonic side of the crisis. The archbishop and everyone there were, of course, dismayed at the silence of the Holy Father, thinking a worse response to the crisis could not be given. But fortunately a statement is being prepared on this, and the silence will end. Do please pray for this...so much depends on the pope to say and do the right thing. We’ll just have to wait for the statement. Also, the way the archbishop handled many very difficult questions was edifying. I’m proud of him.

- We hit a snag on the sanctuary construction right off the bat, and after many emails, phone calls and a meeting got it sorted out. I must say that the construction office of the Archdiocese was extremely helpful. The snag was over contracts, but I expect many more snags to come. It adds to the stress greatly, but having such good help from the Archdiocese is a real blessing. I think the enemy hates what we are doing to his Enemy’s church.

- For this reason, the Litany of Loreto will be sung or recited at the Thursday holy hour for nine weeks to ask our Lady’s intercession for the sanctuary remodel. Expect a bulletin insert with drawings on the project soon.

The article begins with “Later this month, all of the three major consumer credit bureaus will be required to offer free credit freezes to all Americans and their dependents. Maybe you’ve been holding off freezing your credit file because your home state currently charges a fee for placing or thawing a credit freeze, or because you believe it’s just not worth the hassle. - Here are the next three paragraphs:

There are dozens of private companies that specialize in providing consumer credit reports and scores to specific industries, including real estate brokers, landlords, insurers, debt buyers, employers, banks, casinos and retail stores. A handy PDF produced earlier this year by the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau (CFPB) lists all of the known entities that maintain, sell or share credit data on U.S. citizens.

The CFPB’s document includes links to Web sites for 46 different consumer credit reporting entities, along with information about your legal rights to obtain data in your reports and dispute suspected inaccuracies with the companies as needed. My guess is the vast majority of Americans have never heard of most of these companies.

Via numerous front-end Web sites, each of these mini credit bureaus serve thousands or tens of thousands of people who work in the above mentioned industries and who have the ability to pull credit and other personal data on Americans. In many cases, online access to look up data through these companies is secured by nothing more than a username and password that can be stolen or phished by cybercrooks and abused to pull privileged information on consumers.
