Catechism on Holy Week

When we consider the reformed Holy Week of the Ven. Pius XII, the dates are useful. The *Ordo Hebdomadae Sanctae* (Order of Holy Week) of 1955-1956 begins the huge changes in the liturgy, the “battering ram” as Fr. Braga said, against the traditional liturgy. I’ll just abbreviate it as OHS 1956.

One of the first changes had to do with the color of the vestments. In the *Missale Romanum* 1952 (MR 1952 from here on), violet is used for both the procession and the Mass following. But in the archives of the Commission for the changes, the justification to change the color came from a professor of pastoral theology from a Swiss seminary. He said, “One thing that perhaps might be done...the color red might be restored as was used in the Middle Ages for this solemn procession. The color red recalls the royal purple. In this way the procession is distinguished as something *sui generis*.”

Several things should be noted about this. First, perhaps red does recall the royal purple, but it is very difficult to see how. In the traditional Roman Rite, red always signified either the blood of martyrdom or the fire of the Holy Ghost, though in the Ambrosian Rite it symbolizes the blood of the Passion.

Second, the assertion that this was the practice in the middle ages turns out to be unproven. There is no evidence for this.

Third, the search for things that are *sui generis* in the liturgy and then inserting them willy-nilly into the liturgy is a questionable practice.

The use of violet for both the procession and the Mass shows I think, a better connection between the two events of the triumphal procession into Jerusalem, and the fact that He was entering the city in order to suffer, die and be buried. The use of violet therefore, is the better symbolism.

From the Pastor:

- The intention for this week’s Holy Hour is in reparation for the sins of the hierarchy and clergy.

- I was going to make my canonical retreat with the Benedictine sisters in Gower, MO this month, but the City of Littleton has scheduled our permit hearing for the parish hall construction on the 13th, right when I was going to go. I’ll try to reschedule the retreat for either October or November.

- There will be an emergency presbyterate meeting for all the priests of the Archdiocese on September 12th. The accusations about the Holy Father are extremely serious, so the Archbishop wants to speak to all of us about this. That’s another reason to stay here I suppose.

- Your priests have been discussing the developments on the scandals, and in particular the scandal of the Holy Father. I must admit to believing Archbishop Vigano for many reasons. I hope to have a bulletin insert on the subject of the scandals either today or definitely next week.

- I’ve decided that the best thing for us to do during the sanctuary construction is to have the daily Masses in the parish hall. Some parishioners built a very good altar for this, so that first Mass will begin on the 10th. We will turn the church over to the General Contractor on Monday morning, and they will turn it back over to us Saturday afternoon. Sunday Masses will be in the church. Projected completion is the end of November. For feast days such as All Saints, we

will still use our church...there will be scaffolding up but still quite usable.

At one point I knew we were not on the right trail, and asked a senior instructor, “Should I say something?” He smiled and shook his head “no.” We bushwhacked quite a distance off course until the freshman leader realized it wasn’t right, and then we backtracked. I was so impressed by this, especially with the patience not only of the instructors but the good cheer of the other students. This sort of thing, combined with the integration of much prayer into the training, was a great blessing to see.
