From the Pastor:

- There will be no holy hour this week. Instead, it is the feast of Corpus Christi, and we will have a high Mass at 7pm, as well as our regular 2 morning Masses.

- Next week's holy hour will be offered in reparation for the practice of alkaline hydrolysis in the State of Colorado.

- A parishioner suggested this for a holy hour of reparation. I thought it was a good idea. If you don't know about this, here is a quote from a website which enthusiastically extols the practice. "Alkaline hydrolysis uses water, alkaline chemicals, heat, and sometimes pressure and agitation, to accelerate natural decomposition, leaving bone fragments and a neutral liquid called effluent. The decomposition that occurs in alkaline hydrolysis is the same as that which occurs during burial, just sped up dramatically by the chemicals. The effluent is sterile, and contains salts, sugars, amino acids, and peptides. There is no tissue and no DNA left after the process completes. This effluent is discharged with all other wastewater, and is a welcome addition to the water systems."

"With all other wastewater." The contempt for human dignity, and for the body which was a temple of the Holy Ghost by Baptism is at such a level that you can smell the brimstone surrounding this utterly inhuman practice. Please God some politicians will move to stop this practice, though I'm not holding my breath. In the meantime, we pray.

- Another threat to human dignity stems from the hard facts of neurological diseases in our country. The Harvard Neuro Discovery Center says that approximately five million Americans have Alzheimer's disease, more than one million have Parkinson's disease, more than four hundred thousand have multiple sclerosis, and approximately thirty thousand have amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (Lou Gehrig's disease). The numbers are even more sobering when we consider the future, especially as those

who make it to older ages tend to live longer and longer. Worldwide, the number of people living with dementia is set to double every twenty years. Simply put, we already do not have the caregivers necessary to take care of the populations as they exist now. It is not clear, therefore, what we will do twenty years from now.

Given how the significant lack of ethics (in my opinion) played out with the rush to manufacture "vaccines" for the Virus, and how eagerly the population embraced these, it seems to me that the current vaccine situation is a trial run for a future lack of ethics concerning neurological disease. The medical industrial complex is a juggernaut, and will barely experience the reins from the government, and will be able to shrug off any feckless "statements of concern" by the bishops. So we must be prepared to say "no" to many things, despite enormous pressure to cooperate with treatments and procedures which will be dubiously ethical at best, and outrageously evil at worst.

- The preparation for this will be our union with God, and our loyal and fierce love for our Holy Mother the Church. It will also require great attachment to the saints and the angels; especially St. Mary and St. Joseph. And if this loyalty is profound, the coming years might see a flowering of religious orders dedicated to the care of the sick, as we used to have. The future 20 years may be a time of a glorious love of God and neighbor by the dry martyrdom of the care of the sick. Or a wet martyrdom.
