We ask that you please park on the street instead while we work on finding a parking solution for our large, and still growing, parish. We also ask that if you are able bodied without young children that you would please park farther away from the church so that those with little ones and the elderly are able to park closer to the church. Thank you for your understanding and cooperation.

Priest Section—Fr. Kluge

I've been quite involved with the preparations for our school. In the last month alone, I interviewed over 20 potential teachers, all parishioners, all of high quality (at least three of them have Ph.Ds). I have a number of nieces and nephews (ok, only 5, but 5 is a number), and I would gladly have these potential teachers teach them. I can safely say that any one of these would be better than the teachers they currently have, but they live in a far-off land, and have few options.

I myself (with my sister) was homeschooled 'way back when.' My family converted in 1983 when I was 5, and we lived in rural Oregon, with no good schooling options. We were also quite poor; to support us, my father had to work up in Portland, which was an hour and a half commute (one way). My mother had a near-crippling back condition at the time (don't worry, it's taken a back seat to Parkinson's now), so when my father came home at 6:30 he'd pick us kids up, and take us to our own extracurriculars—swimming, karate, etc.—and, if he could, he'd attempt to do Mom's shopping for her, which, if you aren't much of a cook, can be a bit frustrating when needing to make substitutions (also well in the time before cell-phones, not that it is much different now, as my father still does not use one). I was pretty ungrateful for all of this at the time. I didn't understand until later all the sacrifices my parents made for us, so that we could have a safe and happy life out in the country; and homeschooling was part of that life. But it had its downsides, too; as I've said before in a sermon, if you don't have good friends, you'll have bad ones, which I know from experience.

I think we can learn a lot about how we should view education from those Councils of Baltimore cited in the bulletin last week, which instructed that all parishes have schools as early as 1852, culminating in the Third Council (1884), Title vi, which "treats of (i) Catholic schools, especially parochial, viz., of their absolute necessity and the obligation of pastors to establish them....It is desirable that these schools be free" (Catholic Encyclopedia).

Half a century later, Pope Pius XI gave a great defense and explanation of Catholic schooling in *Divini Illius Magistri* (1929). I encourage you to read the whole thing; here is just a taste:

40. We have therefore two facts of supreme importance: The Church placing at the disposal of families her office of mistress and educator, and the families eager to profit by the offer, and entrusting their children to the Church in hundreds and thousands. These two facts recall and proclaim a striking truth of the greatest significance in the moral and social order. They declare that the mission of education regards before all, above all, primarily the Church and the family, and this by natural and divine law, and that therefore it cannot be slighted, cannot be evaded, cannot be supplanted.

77. Since however the younger generations must be trained in the arts and sciences for the advantage and prosperity of civil society, and since the family of itself is unequal to this task, it was necessary to create that social institution, the school. But let it be borne in mind that this institution owes its existence to the initiative of the family and of the Church, long before it was undertaken by the State. Hence considered in its historical origin, the school is by its very nature an institution subsidiary and complementary to the family and to the Church. It follows logically and necessarily that it must not be in opposition to, but in positive accord with those other two elements, and form with them a perfect moral union, constituting one sanctuary of education, as it were, with the family and the Church. Otherwise it is doomed to fail of its purpose, and to become instead an agent of destruction.

80. For the mere fact that a school gives some religious instruction (often extremely stinted), does not bring it into accord with the rights of the Church and of the Christian family, or make it a fit place for Catholic students. To be this, it is necessary that all the teaching and the whole organization of the school, and its teachers, syllabus and text-books in every branch, be regulated by the Christian spirit, under the direction and maternal supervision of the Church; so that Religion may be in very truth the foundation and crown of the youth's entire training; and this in every grade of school, not only the elementary, but the intermediate and the higher institutions of learning as well. To use the words of Leo XIII: "It is necessary not only that religious instruction be given to the young at certain fixed times, but also that every other subject taught, be permeated with Christian piety. If this is wanting, if this sacred atmosphere does not pervade and warm the hearts of masters and scholars alike, little good can be expected from any kind of learning, and considerable harm will often be the consequence."
