Priest Section—Fr. Kluge

Around this time of year you start seeing signs pop up that say "Keep Christ in Christmas," as well as a few that say "Keep Mass in Christmas." I'm still hoping people take the next step: "Keep Christmas in Christmas." Well, maybe someday. Someone asked me if it was ok to have Christmas celebrations in Advent; I said I thought it was about as appropriate as celebrating Easter in Lent. There is a slight difference, though, in that Lent is a continual march towards the Cross, while Advent is indeed focused on the coming of our Lord, and on wonderment at the mystery of His birth. I don't think this difference is enough to justify "Christmas celebrations" during Advent, which seems to be guided rather by the grocery stores that replace their Halloween items with Christmas things on November 1st (I guess "All Saints Candy" hasn't caught on yet)—and perhaps also guided by the urge in all of us to have our reward without any waiting or effort, which desire, I think, necessitated the need of such a Savior to begin with. So maybe it is appropriate, in a certain ironic way. And I do love irony.

Speaking of irony, it's a sort of mixed blessing this time of year with non-Catholics. It's always fun to see otherwise image-hating protestants display 3-D light up images of saints for public veneration. And I do think, for a lot of non-Catholics, this season is much more than just a commercial exercise; to the extent that their stiff necks permit them, they try to bow their heads to our Lord at His birth (even if they're a bit early doing so). And even for unbelievers, practical or otherwise, there remains a little blessing left over whereby they sense something 'magical' in this season, almost as if the graces poured out upon the Church are so rich as to overflow even into the smallest of hearts, and these would-be unbelievers find themselves touched by a sense of generosity and kindness they can't explain.

This isn't always the case, I suppose. My first year at seminary in Oregon we had a remarkable snowstorm the week before Christmas. But to appreciate the irony of this story, I need to back up a little. Part of that 'overflow' happened even in my father's family. My father was raised without any religion, but still, some Catholic traditions seeped down (explained as a 'German' tradition)—such as the idea that you didn't decorate the tree until Christmas Eve. So we maintained this all my life. What is more, the central area of my family home extends two stories. For many years, we would buy our trees from the 'overgrown' lot, some 15 feet or more high, and quite heavy at that. Because of our small family and my mother's bad back, this meant that my father and sister and I would trudge out, usually in the mud, cut down a tree, tie it to the top of the car, and then proceed to drive what looked like a large bush down the highway. Parallel to this, we had a number of Christmas decorations (I know!) we put up around the house, everyone with his favorite. One of my father's favorites was a small snow-globe with a single Christmas tree inside. Every year, when we were little (and even not-so-little, "Daaaaad!"), he would hold it behind his back, and asked us "Do you remember the time we went to get our Christmas tree...and it snowed?!" as he pulled the globe into view. Well, being Oregon, it usually rained, not snowed, around Christmas.

I say this all to lead up to that one year. I hadn't sold my ³/₄ ton pick up yet that I used to get to and from DC (and drive around the city in! that was fun), which was good, because with chains it could navigate the 18 inches or so of thick snow which was dumped upon us (quite unusual for Oregon). My father and I went out, trudged through the snow, cut down a massive fir (albeit not quite 15 feet), and then dragged it the two of us across the top of the snow to the truck. At least it didn't get all muddy! We did this in perfect time to pull into the parking lot of the local church—just as we had planned—with a good 15 or 20 minutes to change before their scheduled daily Mass. There's not much in the way of snow removal when it snows that much, so snow was everywhere, and our truck was the only car in the lot. But as we were wondering if there would be Mass at all, we saw the priest walking out of the church toward us!

"Oh Father!" I said, "We got here just in time. Is there Mass today?" The priest looked a little confused and said, "No, Mass is cancelled because of the snow." "Well, where are you saying your Mass?" I asked hopefully. "I'm not." But at least he let us into the church to pray. I would like to think that such an attitude was far from us, even here; but I was at one of our teacher meetings for the hoped-for school recently, and someone observed that a certain Catholic school didn't have Mass available on one day of the week, because it was "Father's day off." "Bah, humbug!" indeed.
