Dear Parishioners,

Following are some of the saints on the kingship of St. Joseph, and his resemblance to the Old Testament King and Patriarch Joseph. Christ is king not just because he conquered sin, but because he held the actual title, passed down through the generations from King David to St. Joseph, as revealed in the genealogy of Christ in the first chapter of St. Matthew's Gospel. Thus, it was not Herod who was king of the Jews at the birth of Christ, but St. Joseph. Likewise, when Pilate asks Christ during his passion "Are you a king then?" Our Lord rightly and accurately responds "It is as you say." (John 18:37)

St. Peter Julian Eymard (+1868)

"Therefore, since Christ was King, of the line of David, He made Saint Joseph to be born of this same royal line. He wanted him to be noble, of earthly nobility. In the veins of St. Joseph, therefore, flows the blood of David and Solomon, and of all the noble kings of Judah. [If these kings had remained in power until the time of Christ], St. Joseph would be the rightful heir, and would have sat on the throne in his turn."

"Injustice had expelled his family from the throne to which he had the right. For this he is no less a king, the son of these kings of Judah, the greatest, noblest and richest in the world. Thus in the census records of Bethlehem, St. Joseph was inscribed and recognized by the Roman governor as the heir of David: therein lies his royal title, which is easily identifiable, and bears the royal signature."

St. Bernardine of Siena (+1444)

"St. Joseph was born of a patriarchal, royal and princely race in a direct line. [The Gospel of] St. Matthew establishes the direct line of all the fathers from Abraham to the spouse of the Virgin, clearly demonstrating that all patriarchal, royal and princely dignity came together in him."

St. Bernard of Clairvaux (+1153)

What and what manner of man the blessed Joseph was, we may gather from that title wherewith, albeit only as a deputy, God deemed him fit to be honoured, for he was both called, and supposed to be, the Father of God. Remember likewise that great Patriarch Joseph, who was sold into Egypt, from whom St. Joseph not only received his name, but also inherited his purity, and was likened to him in innocence and in grace.

The Patriarch Joseph, sold by his brethren through envy and brought down to Egypt, is a type of Christ sold by a disciple, and handed over to the gentiles. Likewise, St. Joseph fled from the envy of Herod, and carried Christ into gentile Egypt. The Patriarch Joseph kept loyal to his master Potiphar, and would not carnally know his wife; St. Joseph knew that the Lady, the Mother of his Lord, was a virgin, and he himself remained faithfully virgin toward her. To the Patriarch Joseph it was given to know dark things in interpreting of dreams; to St. Joseph it was given in sleep to know the mysteries of the kingdom of heaven.

The Patriarch Joseph set aside bread, not for himself but for all people; St. Joseph received into his keeping that Living Bread Which came down from heaven, not for him only, but for the whole world. We cannot doubt but that St. Joseph was good and faithful to whom was espoused the Mother of the Saviour. Yea, I say, he was a faithful and wise servant, whom the Lord appointed to be the comfort of His own Mother, the keeper of His own Body, and the only and trusted helper in the Eternal Counsels.
