

From Fr. Krager

Excerpts from Uni Una! To the One God My One Soul by Fr Fulgence Meyer

[In the 16th century, when the the so-called Reformation had obliterated the Faith in Greenland, a German Catholic merchant traveled there on business]. He relates that all Catholic priests had been killed or banished. There were few Catholics left. Days before Christmas, in that cold, dark country, they took to the road with lanterns and plowed through the snow to a hut of a certain Catholic family. When there, a man in his 70s greeted all, prayed, and then drew out a tattered, yellow corporal [the linen cloth on which rests the host and chalice at Mass].

From Fr. Krager

"On this sacred linen the last Mass was said in this country 50 years ago. I served that Mass. This holy cloth is all that remains of the Holy Sacrifice. On it rested the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ. Let us kneel and thank God for possession of it and beg Him to send us priests soon again." [compare this attitude to our own love for the Eucharist and priesthood despite our ready access to them both in our land and our time!]

Jesus did not choose among the three crosses lying ready for Him and His companions. He takes the one handed or pointed out to Him and looks upon it as the one prepared for Him by His Father. Those who brought about and sentenced Him to death, are in His eyes the agents of His Heavenly Father. He therefore bears them no ill will, as they are indirectly procuring His everlasting glory. Thus, must we look on those who place a cross of some kind on us, wittingly or not... as our great benefactors if we consider them in the light of God's Providence? Leeches used by doctors work only for their own satisfaction, [and yet their benefit to the patient is just the same.]

Our Lord's Cross was evidently too heavy for His physical strength. He fell under its weight again and again... And yet He did not complain or lose heart [but started again] with renewed willingness and courage. We learn from this, that we must not expect our religious life [or insert state of life here] to be a continuous march from success to success, victory to victory, even spiritually. Jesus fell... that He might merit for us the grace of recovery after our falls. While every moral fall is deplorable... God uses our very sins to raise us indirectly to greater fervor and higher holiness. He uses them to destroy our noxious self-reliance and complacency, to root us deeper in humility.

A great Dutch painter of the Middle Ages had run amuck in morality as a young man. Growing mature of mind and sober of heart with age, he deplored his sins bitterly. He painted his masterpiece, the Deposition of Our Lord from the Cross... He gave his own likeness to Nicodemus, who was taking the nails out of the hands and feet of Jesus... [he said] "God knows that in past years I have driven many a cruel nail into the hands and feet of my Savior by my hideous and countless sins. Is it not time I begin to pluck out these nails before I die?" We draw out a nail from the body of Christ every time we cheerfully suffer either a self-inflicted mortification or one sent by God.

After Alexander had conquered all the then known world within reach, we are told that he looked up to the heavens above and wept because he could not conquer it. [It is] well he wept. He had chosen the wrong way to conquer Heaven. The faithful nun [or insert state of life here] has conquered Heaven, not by grasping and appropriating the earth to herself and enjoying it to the utmost like Alexander, but by despising, renouncing, and foregoing the earth's false treasures and fleeting joys for the love of Jesus Crucified.
