Dear Parishioners,

Can the pope be a heretic? Following are some selections from an article written on this very topic by Bishop Athanasius Schneider in 2019. For the sake of clarity and brevity I have paraphrased some selections, while preserving the substantive idea.

On the Question of a Heretical Pope (Bishop Athanasius Schneider)

There is no historical case of a pope losing the papacy during his term of office due to heresy, although there has been a case where a Pope was accused of heresy after his death. Specifically, Pope Honorius I (625 – 638), who was posthumously excommunicated by three Ecumenical Councils, on the grounds that he supported the heretical doctrine of Monothelitism.

Pope Saint Leo II (+ 682 - 683) confirmed these decrees, however he downgraded the charge of heresy to 'negligence in the the face of heresy' stating *"Honorius, instead of purifying this Apostolic Church, permitted the immaculate faith to be stained by a profane treason."*

Until the 11th century, every new pope, upon taking office, had to swear that he "recognized the sixth Ecumenical Council, which smote with eternal anathema the originators of the heresy of Monotheletism: Sergius, Pyrrhus, **together with Honorius.** Likewise, in some Breviaries until the 18th century, Pope Honorius was mentioned as a heretic in the lessons of Matins for June 28th, the feast of Saint Leo II.

The persistent condemnation of Honorius as a heretic, through so many centuries, shows that **it was not considered scandalous by many generations of Catholics to say that a pope could be guilty of heresy.** In those times, the faithful and the hierarchy of the Church could clearly distinguish between the indestructibility of the Catholic Faith divinely guaranteed to the Magisterium, and the infidelity and treason of a particular pope in the exercise of his teaching office.

It is a dogma of faith that the pope is preserved from heresy when teaching *ex cathedra*. This is the divine guarantee of Our Lord that the gates of hell will not prevail. **But that a pope can be mistaken** when exercising lesser authority, is a contingency shown by faith and history to be quite possible.

The theory that a heretical pope can be deposed, or lose his office *ipso facto*, became a common opinion starting with the High Middle Ages. It remains, however, **only a theological opinion, and not a teaching of the Church.** The practice of the Church until now, in the very rare cases of a pope committing heresy while in office, has been to leave the final judgment to a future pope or Ecumenical Council, such as in the cases of Pope Honorius I and Pope John XXII.

In dealing with the tragic case of a heretical pope, all the members of the Church, bishops and faithful should use all legitimate means of correction, such as public professions of the truth, constant and ardent prayers, and private and public corrections issued to the erring pope.

The extremely rare case of a heretical or erring pope must ultimately be endured and suffered with faith in the divine promise that the Church and the Petrine office are indestructible. We must always remember that in the end, Our Lord will triumph.



Feast Day November 19Died in 1231 at the age of 24Canonized in 1235

Patroness of hospitals, nurses, bakers, brides, countesses, dying children, exiles, homeless people, lace-makers, widows and the Third Order of Saint Francis

Attributes: Roses, crown, food basket

Quote: How could I bear a crown of gold when the Lord bears a crown of thorns? and bears it for me!

St. Elizabeth of Hungary was born into a royal family but found herself being more dedicated to the poor. She was devoted to prayer and service, especially to those in need, which made her very popular among commoners in Europe. She was married at the young age of fourteen to Louis of Thuringia and together in their short but happy marriage they had three children. Unfortunately, Louis was killed during the Crusades. Louis' family thought Elizabeth's generosity was squandering the royal fortune and she was removed from the palace until her husband's fellow crusaders returned.

When they returned from battle and Elizabeth's son was deemed the rightful heir to the throne, she and her family were reinstated. Elizabeth then spent the remaining years of her life in service. She was known for daily distributing loaves of bread to hundreds of the poor, which is how she has become the patron saint of bakers. She also opened and served at a hospital dedicated to Saint Francis. St. Elizabeth's life was cut short as she died before her twenty-fourth birthday in 1231.
