Advent Reflection on Death

There is perhaps no truth today more shunned, suppressed, and vehemently ignored than the reality of death. Modern man is consumed with indulging his slavery to his passions, proclaiming himself free, and absolutely banishing the thought that he will die. He has invented words to shun even the mention of death: "macabre," "morbid." Yet he will murder anyone who gets in the way of his slavery to his passions. The debauchery into which he throws himself keeps his vision blinded to anything but his slavery. He cannot see the one thing in the future he can never avoid or deny. One could make a reasonable case that the historical decline in religious piety correlates with the

decline in death from disease and the general modern advances in technology and comfort which obscure the reality of death. When a man can ignore death, he can ignore God. In the season most dedicated to the Four Last Things - Advent - he keeps himself distracted in his illusion with indulgence and celebrations. Yet by God's grace, no man can ignore death forever. Eventually, a loved one dies. Eventually, a man contracts cancer or some other illness. Eventually he is face to face with what he has skillfully eluded his entire life. Then he will be confronted with this stark reality. Perhaps then he will face the difficult questions. Perhaps then he will turn to God and look over his life... Are you distressed about the state of the Church? Consider your death. The Lord says, He who perseveres to the end shall be saved (Mt. xxiv. 13). Soon you will die and face judgment. What will the Lord say you to you at that time? Did you take the talent and out of fear bury it (Mt. xxv. 25), or did you invest the graces given you to produce merit and save souls? Your death is near at hand, when all of these things will be stripped away from you. As the 15th-century play Everyman shows beautifully, a man can take neither kindred, fellowship, goods, nor strength at death. Only good works can be brought before the judgment seat of Christ. Death causes us to see clearly the reality before us. Death causes us to see the emptiness of created comforts and place all our hope in the Uncreated. Death keeps us safe from lies, vanity, and most of all sin itself. Are you tempted to sin? Consider your death. Soon this empty pleasure will mean nothing at your death. Soon you will regret having taken momentary pleasure and forsaken eternal life. This transitory delight will last but an instant, while eternity will last for all time and beyond. Do not listen to the Devil, who says to you "It matters little. Tomorrow you will confess." Listen instead to your Lord who says: "Fool! This night your life shall be required of you" (Lk. xii. 20), and again: "Keep watch for you know not the day nor the hour" (Mt. xxv. 13). The remembrance of death is victory over every sin.

On Crime and Punishment

According to two sources present at the Vatican meeting where the Pope allegedly called Burke his "enemy," the Pontiff said that Burke's actions were causing "disunity" and that is the reason for his punishment. So there is no specific charge being given here other than these vague slogans which we've heard before. This hearkens back to that seminal essay by Dietrich von Hildebrand in his book *The Charitable Anathema* in which he adroitly summarizes the core issue at stake in the crisis, decades before Pope Francis: "the valuing of unity over truth plays a central role in the crisis of the Church."(1) When the matter of truth is at stake, he says, the Church even breaks her unity for the sake of truth, by using the charitable anathema. Truth divides from falsehood, and the only unity possible is a unity in truth. Cardinal Burke has consistently sought to defend the truths of the Faith, and that is the justification for his actions.

1. The valuing of unity over truth was institutionalized by Pope Paul VI when he relegated the Holy Office/CDF below the Secretariat of State. We will know that sanity has been restored to the Church when this colossal error is reversed.
