

From Fr. Krager

What is the most published and disseminated book in history? The Bible, that is easy. It is a bit trickier to determine which book comes in second place, though. Some will say the Quran, others will say it is Mao Zedong's "Little Red Book." One solid competitor, though, is the Imitation of Christ. It was completed just before the advent of the printing press, but even then, it was republished and translated at an unbelievable rate. Before the year 1900, it had gone through over 6000 republications. The popularity of this work is still high today. When I

was in an airport not too long ago, a Protestant approached me, determined to convert me. After some conversation, he brought up that he was reading a great book called "Imitation of Christ." I thought that was pretty amazing, so I took it and tried to open up to the parts where it talks about the Eucharist. Unfortunately, it was an abridged edition that had been sanitized of all Catholic elements.

The Saints have loved the Imitation of Christ. Ignatius of Loyola constantly read it, saying that "he would open it at random and he always came across something that was close to his heart at that time and which he needed." Saint Therese of Lisieux cites it 14 times in her writings. Saint Thomas More said it is a book everyone should own. It was also beloved by Saint Dominic Savio.

Here are some extracts from this classic of Christian spirituality:

"If God were our one and only desire we would not be so easily upset when our opinions do not find outside acceptance."

"At the Day of Judgement, we shall not be asked what we have read, but what we have done."

"All men desire peace, but very few desire those things that make for peace."

"Jesus has now many lovers of the heavenly kingdom, but few bearers of his cross."

"As long as you live, you will be subject to change, whether you will it or not - now glad, now sorrowful; now pleased, now displeased; now devout, now undevout; now vigorous, now slothful; now gloomy, now merry. But a wise man who is well taught in spiritual labor stands unshaken in all such things, and heeds little what he feels, or from what side the wind of instability blows."

"[The priest, on his vestments,] wears the cross before him that he may mourn his own sins, behind him, that in pity he may mourn the sins of others, and know that he is appointed to stand between God and the sinner, never to become weary of prayer and the holy offering until it is granted him to obtain grace and mercy. When the priest celebrates Mass, he honors God, gladdens the angels, strengthens the Church, helps the living, brings rest to the departed, and wins for himself a share in all good things."
"Do not let your peace depend on the words of men. Their thinking well or badly of you does not make you different from what you are. Where are true peace and glory? Are they not in Me? He who neither cares to please men nor fears to displease them will enjoy great peace, for all unrest and distraction of the senses arise out of disorderly love

and vain fear."
