Vocation comes from the Latin for "calling." In a general sense, it can refer to the call every Christian has to holiness according to whatever state in life he finds himself. In a more particular sense, we speak of vocation in terms of a call to the priesthood or religious life. When a young person is attracted to the priesthood or religious life and actively investigating it, we say he is discerning.

Three aspects of a vocation

1. Aptitude - God does not ask the impossible. There are mental and physical requirements for the priesthood and religious life that may

not be compatible with our own situation. If you are a mute, you can't be a priest, for example. Even if we have a sincere desire to enter into a vocation, if we do not have the aptitude, we must humbly sacrifice that desire, knowing God has something better in store for us.

- 2. Supernatural Motive There are many reasons that someone could desire to enter the priesthood or religious life. Pressure from family is a very bad reason to pursue a vocation. Seminarians and novices have to explicitly state that their decision to enter the monastery or seminary is in no way compelled, but the decision is made freely of one's own volition. Good, supernatural motives would include; a desire to serve Christ more radically, a desire to save souls, a desire to say or assist at Mass daily, etc. Our motives to do many things are often mixed and imperfect, and so we must exercise maturity in examining those motives, bringing them to prayer and talking them over with trusted friends and confessors.
- 3. Call of the Church The Church is a visible, hierarchical communion. This means that we have living, breathing agents of God, however imperfect, in the form of our superiors in religious houses and seminaries. They have experience walking with those who are called to the life and living it joyfully, and probably some sorrowful experiences as well. All of this knowledge forms their decisions. Even bad decisions are ultimately within God's Providence.

Two Common misconceptions

- 1. If I don't choose the correct vocation, I will go to hell. False. There is no sin which the blood of Christ cannot wash away. Even if someone chooses a state of life for the worst reasons imaginable, he can become a saint if he sincerely repents and asks for pardon from God. That being said, graces will be more readily poured out on the Christian who chooses his vocation prayerfully and prudently.
- 2. If I start discerning or I enter the seminary or religious life, I am locked in right away. False. The Church has made it so that permanent commitments in the form of vows come only after many years of formation. This gives the religious community and the individual ample time to discern what is best. Many people have tried their vocation, left, and found the experience to be deeply fulfilling.

Personally, I have a strong memory of being at prayer before I knew the priest council's decision to accept me into major orders in 6th year of seminary. I was anxious at first, but then I thought about how joyful and beneficial the previous years had been to me. An immense peace came and I knew I would be fine no matter the outcome. The time at seminary, among men striving for holiness, assisting at Mass daily, living a life of prayer, work, and study, cannot possibly be wasted by a man of good will.
