

From Fr. Nolan

Meditation on the Sorrowful Mysteries

1st Mystery - The Agony in the Garden. Sorrow for our sins.

Christ sorrowed so much for our salvation that his sweat became as drops of blood. Do I spend any time sorrowing over my sins? If we kept our sins before our eyes, we would be less likely to repeat them. Christ was God, but he was also man, and desired human companionship. Though comforted by an angel, he grieved that his friends, Peter, James and John, slept in his time of agony. Have we been alseep, when others needed us in times of trial? Our Lord's prayer "If it be possible, let this

cup pass me by..." was not to avoid his own sufferings, but to teach us that we can ask God to lessen ours, as long as our prayer includes "...but not my will be done, but thine." Matt 26:39. Have I ever rejected suffering, or been angry that God has allowed me to suffer when I sought to avoid it?

2nd Mystery - The Scourging at the Pillar. Mortification of our senses. Our Lord's scourging was so barbaric, so extreme, that it rendered him unrecognizable: "his face was marred beyond human resemblance" Is 52:14. Christ suffered this extreme cruelty to show us the effect that our sensual sins have on the Mystical Body of Christ. Our sins of lust, gluttony, sloth, drunkenness, indulgence of every kind, may be hidden from the eyes of man, but they are not hidden from God. Let us resolve to overcome sins of the flesh, knowing what they do to the Body of Christ on earth, the Church.

3rd Mystery - The Crowning of Thorns. Mortification of our pride. Our Lord, at the point of death from his scourging, was cruelly crowned with thorns, mocked and ridiculed. If sins of the flesh tear at the body of Christ, sins of pride tear at his head. Vanity, superiority, condescension, arrogance. Have I ever raised myself in pride against God? Demanded answers from Him, as though He owed me something? Have I been angry when God does not answer my prayers, though He sees it would be to my spiritually detriment? How can I complain about unjust treatment, knowing that God accepted scorn, spits, and insults on my behalf?

4th Mystery - The Carrying of the Cross. Fortitude and patience in suffering. Every step of Our Lord's way of the Cross was an agony, and He had thousands ahead of Him. Christ here gives us an example of perseverance. His suffering surpassed the ability of nature to endure, and His life had to be miraculously preserved, that His Passion may continue. Have I ever been so desperate to escape suffering, that I have looked upon death as a relief? But our Lord prayed that death might be forestalled, that he might suffer even more. How can I refuse to suffer any trial, no matter how long or painful, seeing what God suffered for me?

5th Mystery - The Crucifixion. Zeal for the salvation of souls.

All Our Lord's previous sufferings are renewed at His Crucifixion. His garments are ripped off, taking the skin with them, like a second Scourging. The jeers of the crowd renew the insult of the Crown of Thorns. Every breath, for three hours, requires the full weight of His body upon the nail wounds in His feet, another Carrying of the Cross. And He endures all this, knowing that a great multitude of sinners will still reject Him, and be lost forever in hell, renewing His Agony in the Garden. He cries out the first line of Psalm 21, "My God, my God, why hast thou forsaken me?" that we may know He understands what despair feels like. And yet, He thought not of himself, but only of others. Let us imitate Our Lord, and carry no anger, no bitterness, no resentment in our hearts for those who may have hurt us, but rather, pray with Christ "Father forgive them."

St. Joseph Altar

in the OLMC church hall Sunday, March 17, after all Masses.



Q: What is the St. Joseph Altar (or Table)?

A: The St. Joseph Altar comes from Sicily, where it is told that St. Joseph, the island's patron saint, saved the inhabitants from starvation when they appealed to him to give relief from the drought and resultant famine. He is credited with sending the needed rain and later an altar was set up in appreciation, filled with the bountiful harvest, which was given to the poor.

The "tavola di San Giuseppe" has been traditionally erected in homes and parishes as an expression of veneration and gratitude to the Saint for prayers answered and favors received. It is made up of three tiers covered in white cloth, representing the Holy Trinity as well as the ascent from earth to heaven. An image or statue of St. Joseph sits at the top surrounded by flowers and greenery. Down below is displayed the Lenten feast of pastries, fruit and decorative breads for all to enjoy.



The Altar and Rosary Society will be providing the sweets and treats for this Lenten feast. As the gospels tell us that the Holy Family was poor, in honor of St. Joseph, we will be collecting donations for the poor. This will give you the opportunity to fulfill one of the traditional pillars of Lent: almsgiving (to be practiced along with prayer and fasting).

So, on Sunday, March 17, wear red (in honor of St. Joseph) or green (in honor of St. Patrick) and join us in festivities in the church hall. If you'd like to bring food items to the happy event, you are welcome to do so. The categories are pastries, bread, fruit and gluten-free.
