

From Fr. Krager

Homing Instinct

Around this time of year, the sandhill cranes are migrating from their southern habitats up to the north in Canada. Hundreds of thousands of them converge in a narrow strip of land in Nebraska around the Platte River. It is quite a sight to see. It is also one of the very few sights to see in Nebraska, so all of the FSSP seminarians at Our Lady of Guadalupe do an outing to Grand Island, Nebraska in their first year to witness the great migration.

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This migration is just one example among many of the so-called “homing instinct” evident in many animals. The homing instinct is the inherent ability of an animal to navigate towards an original location through unfamiliar areas, either to a home territory or a breeding spot. Many birds migrate, not just sandhill cranes, like those annoying Canada Geese, who can travel even up to 3000 miles between their winter and summer habitats. In addition to birds, many animals possess a remarkable ability to navigate their way home such as bees, dolphins, and salmon. Human beings have selectively bred homing pigeons specifically for their ability to find their way to a very precise home location over distances of up to a thousand miles.

A writer named Caryl Houselander, in a book with the very Catholic title of “Guilt,” comments on this homing instinct in one particular animal, the toad, saying: “Toads are not very popular animals, except perhaps with witches; on the whole men think of them as repulsively ugly, squat, square, horny, coarse and altogether, in spite of the fact that they have beautiful eyes, unattractive... But there is one kind of toad (incidentally, he is the commonest kind, the large brown fellow we find under big stones in the garden) who is a most moving animal, as beautiful as he is grotesque, and for me at all events a symbol of mankind: the homing toad. This toad has an undefeatable drive in him to go back to his home: he can be taken as far away from it as anyone is cruel enough to take him, and he always gets back. Some have taken a homing toad fifty miles from his home, and after marking him in order to be sure of his identity, have let him go, and after weeks he has turned up at home, dusty from many hot dry roads, thin, nearly dead from exhaustion, but back again in his own home, where mercifully he recovers, fills out, becomes a plump happy toad again and falls into a beautiful beatific sleep under his home stone.”

She goes on to show how this homing toad is an image of mankind from which we ought to learn. Original and actual sin has put us far from our true home, a right relationship with God. Our actions and the events of our lives oftentimes seem grotesque and senselessly ugly. We gradually wither away in anxiety and hunger in this foreign, unintelligible land. But even in our ugliest sins, there is an underlying desire for and orientation towards God, though it be oftentimes horribly contorted. One writer has said “even the young man who rings the bell at the brothel is unconsciously looking for God.”

The Lord has made us for himself, to dwell with him in the true home of heaven. During this time of Easter, we are especially called to meditate on this fact, which is why the liturgy is all about peace and final victory. If we are far from home, resisting God's grace, not making use of the Sacraments, or we know of any friends or family in this situation, let us pray and work to return ourselves and others to that true home of a right relationship with God.
