The Catholic Church in Korea

Many people think that the shortage of priests and religious we are currently experiencing is a big reason for the troubles in the Church. However, I am not aware of any time in history where there were "enough" priests and religious. And yet, the Church could still flourish due to the zeal of the priests and religious there were, and also due to the power of a well formed laity. The clearest demonstration of the power of a well formed laity would be found in Korea. The Catholic Faith there spread without any missionaries at all.

The peninsula was, for many centuries, closed off to all foreign visitors and became one of the most isolated places in the world. The only country with which it maintained relations was China. In China, some missionaries were permitted at times. For example, Jesuits were permitted even to join the courts of the emperors due especially to their knowledge in subjects such as astronomy and mathematics. While there, they would write works in Chinese about science, but also Faith. Korean scholars would copy and translate these works and bring them back to Korea.

This mostly happened in the 1500s. Some Koreans became interested in Catholicism, but did not convert. In the 1700s, a man named Yi Seung-hung read those works and became convinced of the Catholic Faith. He traveled to China, was baptized, and returned to Korea to preach, bringing more books, crucifixes, and rosaries. In a few years, he made 4,000 converts. These converts mostly belonged to the aristocratic and scholarly class called the "Yangban." This is interesting because these people had the most to lose by conversion, and they would be the most resilient to arguments since they would have been exposed to many other ideas by their studies. After 10 years, a single priest came to minister to the new Catholics.

In 1801, hundreds of Korean Catholics would receive the palm of martyrdom in the first persecution. The King and nobles were Confucians and saw Catholicism as a threat to the Korean way of life and tried to use violence to snuff it out. It was the first of many persecutions that would occur over the next century, during which over 10,000 Catholics gave their lives for Christ. Very few Korean priests were ordained during this time, and only a handful of French missionary priests were able to infiltrate the country. The laity kept the Faith, regardless, and many became great saints. Look up the Korean martyrs and read some of their stories. Their devotion and suffering will bring tears to your eyes.

Nowadays, despite many setbacks, there are millions of Catholics in South Korea. The Church is growing even though the country's population overall is shrinking. In the North, the Faith is illegal, but there are dozens of clandestine parishes without priests operating as the earliest Korean Catholics did, awaiting the day they will be able to receive all the Sacraments again.

We can learn many things from the Catholic Church in Korea. For one, we should not fear any sort of persecution we have to suffer or sacrifice we have to make for our Faith. These sorts of things will always work to purify us and make us more like Christ, they will always be fruitful if we place them at his feet.

We can also see the great importance of spiritual reading. The early Korean Catholics didn't have the luxury of putting their Faith on the backburner and entrusting zealous, abundant priests and religious to spoon-feed them everything Faith related and to do the work of preaching, teaching, and organizing the Church. Rather, they had to rely on their own prayer, study, and work. They knew that their neighbor would only hear of the saving message of Christ if they spoke it and could defend it by their example and explanations. Many of your friends and neighbors are probably in the same position of not being in contact with any priests or religious, and have only you to be a witness to Christ and His Church.


