From the Press

On Ambrose and Accompanying (John Grondelski, Crisis Magazine)

St. Ambrose was the great fourth-century bishop of Milan. A major reason he was chosen for that See was his opposition to the Arian heresy... His influence as a churchman is unquestionable: he was responsible for the conversion of St. Augustine, who himself held

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Ambrose up as the model bishop. His preaching and teaching were so powerful that he was regarded as one of four great ancient doctors of the Church... Theodosius was Roman Emperor in the late fourth century. Around 390, there was a massacre of citizens in Thessalonica... killed in collective punishment for the lynching of a Roman soldier who had a popular charioteer arrested for pederasty... Blame for the punishment was laid on Theodosius and his "choleric" temper... Theodosius made his way to Milan in the hope of repentance (and to redeem himself both politically as well as spiritually by ecclesiastical pardon). St. Ambrose did not want to be seen as sanctioning or whitewashing Theodosius' deed, so he conveniently made himself absent from the city, corresponding with the errant Emperor and demanding extended public penance on his part prior to his restoration to full Communion. This Theodosius did. The tradition (and artists) turned that call for repentance and conversion into a confrontation at the cathedral door, where Ambrose bars Theodosius - dressed as an emperor - from entering the church until he first dons penitential habit and performs public penance for his bloodletting... This depiction stuck - and stuck positively - in the Catholic imagination. For centuries, nobody suggested that Ambrose was the "bad guy" or Theodosius the "abused victim." ... Which makes me wonder: What would Francis have done with an Ambrose standing in the emperor's path? Would he invite his early resignation? Tell us he's been wrongly criticized before taking that resignation? Give him a coadjutor with right-ofsuccession? ... Or - in Francis' fashion of criticizing those "who sit in the chair of Moses" - would he criticize the Milanese doctor for holding up the chair of Peter? Or send him a note on what proper "theology" is and how to apply it "pastorally?" Would we be told Ambrose was "weaponizing" Eucharist the and being "unaccompanying"? History tells us that Ambrose did not hesitate to exclude a politician from the Bread of Life for his crimes against life. History tells us Ambrose welcomed Theodosius first to show real repentance, which Theodosius did. One might ask: Who should be taking lessons from whom?

On Sedevacantism (Joseph Bevan, Rorate Caeli)

For the vast majority of laymen and clergy who have abandoned the Pope in favor of the various versions of sedevacantism (SV), it doesn't end there. In the spiritual life one gets better, or one gets worse. One doesn't simply stay the same. From initially laughing at the Holy Father and mocking [him], one can graduate to open and vehement dislike, aided and abetted by the internet. It will not be long before one goes only to SV Masses which may not happen more than once a month in special chapels where prayers for the Pope are left out. Sermons designed to fortify the faithful in the SV position can ultimately wear them down and they may start to miss Mass altogether as despair takes hold. Finally, they may give up their Catholic religion, which was what the Devil was planning all along.

Christmas Nativity Scene

Dating back to the 2nd century, the Catacombs of Rome hold some of the earliest Christian depictions of the nativity scene. These underground burial sites featured frescoes and carvings which portrayed biblical scenes, including the birth of Our Lord. The catacombs played a significant role in preserving the early Christian faith and its visual representations. These ancient artworks serve as evidence of the prominence and early fascination with the nativity story.

In the 13th century, St. Francis of Assisi was instrumental in popularizing the nativity scene. Motivated by the pervasive coldness to the reality of the Incarnation and Our Lord's temporal birth due to the influence of Gnosticism, Francis wanted to rekindle devotion, Francis's initiative had a lasting impact and the tradition of setting up nativity scenes spread across Europe. To our own creche, in addition to the historical figures, this year we added those of saints whose feast days immediately follow the Lord's Nativity, which saints are closely associated with and highlight the Incarnation:

St Stephen (Dec 26) - one of the first seven deacons (symbolized by his dalmatic and tonsure) and Protomartyr, being the first to willingly shed his blood as a witness to the Incarnation and the Gospel. Stoned to death, Stephen's figure carries the martyr's palm with stones at his feet. The words on the open book are from the Acts of the Apostles (6:15): They saw that his face was like the face of an angel.

<u>St John (Dec 27)</u> - the Evangelist, whose Gospel is an extended meditation on the great mystery of the Incarnation, opening with its incomparable Prologue declaring the eternity of the Son of God who entered his own creation, The words on the open pages of the book which he carries are from his gospel (Jn 1:14): And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us.

The Holy Innocents (Dec 28) - those male children aged two and under who were slaughtered out of hatred of Our Lord, whose temporal birth in Bethlehem had been foretold by the prophet Micah and announced by the Magi. The Innocents also carry the martyr's palm.
