### First Sunday of Advent November 30, 2025

#### From Fr. Stack

The season of Advent begins on the Sunday closest to the Feast of St. Andrew, which happens to be the same day this year. The First Sunday of Advent takes precedence in such a case and thus, to some degree, overshadows this great Apostle. It is nothing new for Andrew whose brother tends to overshadow him as well. After all, St. Peter was charged with being Christ's Vicar on Earth, he was entrusted with the Keys and called to be Rock, a unifying principle for the Church Militant as he confirmed his brethren in the Faith. St. Peter is enormously important for us Catholics and particularly for us here at Our Lady of Mt. Carmel who benefit from the priests of the Fraternity that bears his name. However, St. Andrew is also an important model for us in regards to the spiritual life and to our own call to bring others to Christ.

On this day that we celebrate the frater Sancti Petri, we might remember how it was Andrew that first introduced Peter to our Blessed Lord:

"And the two disciples heard him speak, and they followed Jesus. And Jesus turning, and seeing them following him, saith to them: What seek you? Who said to him, Rabbi, (which is to say, being interpreted, Master,) where dwellest thou? He saith to them: Come and see. They came, and saw where he abode, and they stayed with him that day: now it was about the tenth hour. And Andrew, the brother of Simon Peter, was one of the two who had heard of John, and followed him. He findeth first his brother Simon, and saith to him: We have found the Messias, which is, being interpreted, the Christ. And he brought him to Jesus. And Jesus looking upon him, said: Thou art Simon the son of Jona: thou shalt be called Cephas, which is interpreted Peter." (Jn 1:37-42)

Andrew is completely convinced that our Lord is the Messiah and says as much to his brother Simon Peter. How is it that he was convinced that this Rabbi whom John the Baptist called the Lamb of God was indeed the long-awaited Messiah? Was it merely a short visit with the Lord and a quick glimpse of where He had been staying? The great Scripture scholar Cornelius a Lapide recalls our Lord's admission that, "Foxes have holes, and birds of the air have nests, but the Son of Man hath not where to lay his head" (Mt. 8:20). In other words, the disciples were not going to find a great house within which our Lord was staying. Their deeper desire, however, and what they did find, was an opportunity in which the Lord might instruct them in divine things.

That this took place at the tenth hour (i.e. 4:00pm) is of great importance. Cornelius a Lapide points out that this would be just two hours before sunset and thus, "St. John adds these words, to show both the zeal of Christ, who though night was nigh, would not put them off to the following day, but entered immediately upon the things pertaining to salvation; as also to show the ardent devotion of the disciples to Christ, who, careless about their night's lodging, had rather spend the night in listening to Christ, than at home in their beds."

This ardent devotion pays off for the disciples, who, desiring to find where the Lord abode, come to understand that God's dwelling place is with man (Cf. Rev. 21:3). Isaiah's prophecy has come to fulfillment in this Rabbi who is the Messiah, who is Emmanuel—that is, God with us. It is no accident that St. John gives account of this moment in the life of St. Andrew within the first chapter of his Gospel. It comes immediately after the Prologue—we perhaps know it better as the Last Gospel at Mass—in which St. John is very clear that our Blessed Lord is the Word of God, the Logos, who has not only been with God but is God from all eternity, and has now taken to Himself human flesh and dwells among us.

Central to our Faith is the Incarnation; without it, we do not have the Christ. In order that we are well disposed to receive Him, we are given a season of prayer and penance to prepare for the great Feast Day of His Birth. Might we approach Advent much like St. Andrew approached the Lord: responding to the Lord's invitation to come and see and thus praying through the night of Advent that, come Christmas day, we are convinced of who He is—the Christ, Emmanuel, God who has made His dwelling with man in the flesh. Then, like St. Andrew, we can let this truth take precedence over our lives and go proclaim it to the ends of the earth.


