Veni, veni Emmanuel

From the Pastor

For seven days prior to the vigil of Our Lord's Nativity (i.e., from Dec 17), the Church celebrates the Greater Ferias of Advent, days which foster a growing sense of expectation of the Messiah's coming. On these days, the Vespers' Magnificat 'O' antiphons address Our Lord by several titles from the sacred scriptures.

The first antiphon begins: O Wisdom who proceeds from the mouth of the Most High, reaching from end to end mightily, disposing all things with strength and prudence... recalling from the book of Sirach hints at the forthcoming Incarnation: I came out of the mouth of the most High, the firstborn before all creatures... Then the creator of all things said to me... Let your dwelling be in Jacob and your inheritance in Israel... From the beginning and before the world I was created, and unto the world to come I shall not cease to be, imagery recalled in the prologue of John's gospel.

The second antiphon begins: O Adonai and leader of the house of Israel, who appeared to Moses in the burning bush and gave him the Law on Sinai, recalling Israel's Exodus from Egypt when Moses was given the first and greatest commandment: I am the Lord your God... you shall not have strange gods before me, which would be appropriated to Our Lord. Prefiguring the virginal conception and birth, God appeared to Moses in a bush aflame and yet not consumed and revealed His name: I am who am, the divine name which Our Lord took for Himself: Before Abraham was, I am.

The third antiphon begins: O root of Jesse... before whom kings shall not open their lips... recalling Isaiah's prophesy of the Messiah's Davidic descent: There shall come forth a branch out of the root of Jesse, and a flower shall rise up out of his root. And the spirit of the Lord shall rest upon him.

The fourth antiphon begins: O Key of David and Scepter of the house of Israel, recalling the Messiah's descent through David from the tribe of Judah, according to Jacob's prophesy at the dawn of history: The scepter shall not be taken away from Judah, nor a ruler from his thigh, till he comes who is to be sent, and he shall be the expectation of the nations. St Matthew records: When Jesus therefore was born in Bethlehem of Judah in the days of King Herod, Herod not of the tribe of Judah, but an Edomite, telling that the allotted time had run its course.

The fifth antiphon begins: O Orient splendor of eternal light and sun of justice: come and enlighten them who sit in darkness and in the shadow of death, recalling Isaiah's prophesy that the Messiah would be a light to the world. St Matthew recalls: And leaving the city Nazareth, he came and dwelt in Capharnaum on the sea coast, in the borders of Zabulon and of Nephthali; that it might be fulfilled which was said by Isaiah the prophet: Land of Zabulon and land of Nephthali, the way of the sea beyond the Jordan, Galilee of the Gentiles: The people which sat in darkness, has seen great light: and to them who sat in the region of the shadow of death, light has sprung up.

The sixth antiphon begins: O King of nations and their desired one, and the corner stone who makes both one, recalling St Peter's words: Wherefore it is said in the scripture: Behold, I lay in Sion a chief corner stone, elect, precious. And he that shall believe in him shall not be confounded. To you therefore who believe, he is honor: but to them that believe not, the stone which the builders rejected, the same is made the head of the corner.

The seventh antiphon which begins: O Emmanuel, our King and Lawgiver, the Expectation and Savior of the nations, is a summary: the Messiah who is the expectation of the nations, who is the Davidic King descended from Judah through the root of Jesse, who is the I am who gave the Law to Moses on Sinai, who came out of the mouth of the most High, the firstborn before all creatures, the ruler in Israel [whose] going forth is from the beginning, a light to the world, whose name shall be called Wonderful, Counselor, God the Mighty, the Father of the world to come, the Prince of Peace, of whom Isaiah prophesied: Behold a virgin shall conceive, and bear a son and his name shall be called Emmanuel, a name which means 'God with us'.

Such was the infant born in a stable, lying in a manger.

Come, Holy Spirit

One of the most precious gifts in the legacy of Frank Duff to the Legion of Mary is his teaching and encouragement on devotion to the Holy Spirit. His first reference to this doctrine is found in his pamphlet 'Can We Be Saints?' He begins by speaking almost lyrically about the presence of God in his works, what we call the omnipresence of God and then he moves from the presence of God in everything around us to His presence within us. He writes: "You are the Temple of the Holy Spirit who is in you (2 Cor. 6.16). In considering God in his works around us, we are not to forget His presence in ourselves. It is of Catholic doctrine that the Holy Spirit makes a dwelling in anyone who is free from mortal sin. Life would be greatly brightened if we could bring home to ourselves this wonderful truth."
