From the Press

The Byzantine Antidote to Low Mass (Gregory DiPippo, NLM)

I had a chat with one of the wise men I consult about such things, and we got to talking about the length of the service known as All-night Vigil... The term "all" in "All-night" is something of a rhetorical exaggeration, but in large monasteries such as the great houses on Mt Athos, not by much, and this was his description of the order of services for a patronal feast which he attended at one of them: Ninth Hour, Small Vespers, dinner in the refectory with

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solemn procession from the church and then back afterwards. Break for confessions. Beginning of All-Night Vigil proper: Vespers with Artoklasia (4 hours; the troparia at the artoklasia took 30 minutes with the terirems, Psalm 103 took 1.5 hours). Reading of the Saint's Life (around midnight). After the Kontakion of the Sixth Ode they passed to a full Akathistos (I went to sleep at that point) (Presumably) First, Third, and Sixth Hours, Divine Liturgy.

A Protestant Comments on Worshiptainment (You Tube)

Many Christians take worship in Church for granted. In my church, some <u>come late for service</u>, dose off during service, <u>come dressed inappropriately</u>, chit chat during service, <u>playing with their phones while the service is going</u> on etc. All these they do in the holy presence of God. Would they do the same if they were invited to attend a meeting with someone very important like the King? God is above all and yet some do not show Him reverence and claim to be worshipping Him. May God help them to be faithful and fear God.

Assessing Interreligious Dialogue (Fr Alexis Portella, Crisis)

The Pontiff also went to visit the Blue Mosque in Istanbul, where, at the behest of his guide the imam Askin Musa Tunca, he was invited to pray saying: "This is the house of Allah—it's not my house; it's not your house." To which Leo responded: "No, I'll just look around."

Unlike his predecessors Benedict XVI and Francis, the reigning Pontiff showed no condescension toward the religion of the Koran, regardless of the controversy he anticipated would follow. And, indeed, almost immediately the Vatican Press Office tried to do some damage control...

The Roman pontiff made it clear that - notwithstanding his meeting with Turkish leader... who in 2020 turned the 1,500-year-old church of Hagia Sophia, built by the Emperor Justinian I, into a mosque - his visit was a pastoral and an ecumenical one. In other words, he was not there to appease a religion that, since its inception 1,400 years ago, has killed Christians and other non-Muslims alike, conquering and stripping their lands.

Yet there is an artifice to the interreligious dialogue in that there can be some sort of congruence with a religion that refuses to call God "Father" and simultaneously acknowledge that Jesus Christ is the divine Son of God and not just an inferior prophet to Muhammad, as Muslims hold...

I myself do not have a single problem, and nor should any Catholic, in having interreligious dialogues and encounters if they are geared to drawing Muslims (and other non-Christians) to embracing the fullness of who God is as taught by the Catholic Church which He Himself founded. Yet what we have had for the last 60 years has been a political dynamic that, by its very nature, is incompatible with the Gospel teaching of Jesus Christ.

From a sociopolitical perspective, there can be a meeting of minds with Muslims to defend the institution of the family, since they collectively are against same-sex unions and every other type of LGBTQ+ agenda. But then it would no longer be "interreligious" dialogue. It would be beneficial if the Holy See reevaluates this endeavor, and not just for our sake. Otherwise, they will continue to be, as Dr. Imtiyaz Yusuf, Research Fellow at the Center for Islam in the Contemporary World, argues, "one-time meetings or a photo opportunity, or what I call 'goody-goody dialogue,' where you just talk about the good in one's own religion and the good in other religions."
