From Fr. Stack

"I have discovered that all the unhappiness of men arises from one single fact, that they cannot stay quietly in their own chamber... on further consideration, when, after finding the cause of all our ills, I have sought to discover the reason of it, I have found that there is one very real reason, namely, the natural poverty of our feeble and mortal condition...when we imagine a king attended with every pleasure he can feel, if he be without diversion, and be left to consider and reflect on what he is, this feeble happiness will not sustain him." In paragraph 139 of his *Pensées*, Blaise Pascal writes one of his most famous lines in which he claims to have discovered the reason for humanity's unhappiness—namely, an inability to sit quietly in one's room. Pascal is not suggesting that we should all live lives of solitary confinement, though one might argue that this would at least eliminate inter-personal conflict. Instead, as Pascal continues to reflect upon the need for solitary time in silence, he indicates that this will force an individual to “reflect on what he is.” (2)

Pascal titles this paragraph “Diversion”, and though he lived in the 1600s, it is clearly worth consideration in our own day. We live in a time fraught with diversions, that is distractions, a time in which people cannot sit still for more than one second before reaching for their phone. No matter whether we are in a home, a car, a restaurant, or merely walking down the street, we are assaulted by distractions—advertisements, news, sports, food, drugs, etc.

What if, as Pascal suggests, we take a moment to consider “the natural poverty of our feeble and mortal condition”—memento mori? Can we not see that all of the distractions that offer a moment of fleeting pleasure can do nothing to preserve us from death? And, in so remembering death, ought we not consider Life and then, who we are as His creature? This, of course, necessitates time of solitary prayer in the silence of our room, just as our Lord instructed: “when you pray, go into your room, and when you have shut your door, pray to your Father who is in the secret place” (Mt 6:6).

Sadly, the notion of silence, let alone prayer in the midst of silence, terrifies most people. We are often afraid to look into the mirror of silence and confront our true self illumined by the God who speaks to us there with a still quiet whispering sound. So, we busy ourselves with the plethora of diversions that offer a moment of distraction from the nagging questions, “who am I, how have I been made, and for what purpose?” However, should we set to task taking time for solitary prayer in the silence of our inner room, we might discover the One who is the source of happiness and who will make up for our poverty. Then, we will no longer need to waste time on such absurd diversions as whether a man can get pregnant. Instead, we will come to know what man is and the God for whom man was made and to whom we will render an account when death removes all diversions.

As a brief aside, the question, “What is a Man?”, is apparently a needed follow-up to the question, “What is a Woman?” posed by Matt Walsh a few years ago, this being evidenced recently by the interchange between Senator Josh Hawley and Dr. Nisha Verma - a medical expert - who could not state the very simple biological reality that men cannot get pregnant. How can a licensed MD not state this truth?
